

PERSECUTED CHURHES IN JORDAN

CULTURE

For the Jordanians, family is very important. They love large families. Most of the people have been there for generations. Their cultural food is Jordanian cuisine, fruits and vegetables are also highly valued.



STATISTICS

In Jordan 170 000 out of 10 301 000 people are Christians. That's only 1.7% of the population! Most Christians belong to Roman Catholic or Orthodox churches that are approved of by the government.

PERSECUTION

Christians are persecuted because they are converts from Islam. Because of the predominance of Islam they have been persecuted in psychological and social ways. Often even by their own families.





GOVERNMENT LAWS

Jordanian law can put someone in jail for speaking badly about Mohammed or speaking negatively about the government. The Government also controls some marriages, and divorces. In summary, persecution isn't strictly government induced but by Sharia law judges in family affairs, since family is most important in society

HOW CAN WE HELP

One of the most important things we can do to support the Christians in Jordan is to pray. It is the most powerful and effective way. Another way is to donate to organisations that help with training the people in their faith, relief aid, and rehabilitation

Chromebook Observations and Recommendations

As I've been in classes and hallways over the past few weeks, I've observed students using their Chromebooks in various ways. I've seen students carefully putting their Chromebooks into a sleeve before leaving the classroom. I've seen students shove their Chromebooks haphazardly into their lockers. I've seen Chromebooks fall out of lockers to land on the tile floor. I've seen Chromebooks slide off desks onto the floor.

I've also had a Chromebook brought to me that had a damaged screen because of a fall or drop, which comes with a significant repair or replacement cost.

Most of the Chromebooks that we see damaged or needing replacement have one thing in common – they are not protected by a case and/or sleeve. Cases and sleeves are available on Amazon for a reasonable cost (usually around \$30) and come in a variety of styles and colours. This small investment will provide extra protection to student Chromebooks in case of accidental drops or falls.

As a reminder, our students have these models of Chromebooks:

Grade 9: Lenovo 300e Gen 3
Grade 10&11: Samsung 310XBA-K01

Grade 12: Lenovo 100e 2nd GenA case will help protect the Chromebook while in use (in class) while a sleeve provides protection during transport (between classes, or in backpacks on the bus).





Course Updates

Grade 9

Bible 9 – Mrs. Vandermeyden: We have been working through the steps of writing an essay this past week. Students should come to class with a printed rough draft on Monday for peer assessment - there is likely some work to do at home this weekend! Final drafts are due at the beginning of class on Thursday, November 23. On Thursday, we will begin our study of Wisdom Literature.

French 9 – Mrs. Bergsma: On Monday and Tuesday, the students completed their final assessment for unit two. We started unit three on Wednesday and learned some new vocabulary to help us express what we do in different seasons. We're also starting to look at suggestion, desire, and obligation statements, and how to use them properly.

Healthy Active Living 9 – Mr. Pennings: We are currently in the Y each day working on our movement skills while learning the sport of badminton. The badminton knowledge test is on Tuesday, Nov 29. Each Wednesday the class is in health in room A/B. We are studying healthy eating habits. The nutrition label reading assignment is due today, the healthy eating plan is due next Wednesday, Nov 22.

Learning Strategies 9 – Mrs. Pieterman: This week we concluded our Literature Circle study of "I am David", but we're not quite done with the book yet! As part of our Writing Wednesdays students are working on a book report of the novel, practicing their analysis skills and also learning how to format their work in MLA style. Book reports are due Tuesday, November 21. Next week we will watch the movie based on the novel, and compare the effectiveness of the different types of media.

Science 9 – Mr. Ellens: We are well into our unit on electricity. We have worked through some characteristics of static electricity and are now working on current electricity. We are drawing circuit diagrams, we are building parallel and series circuits, we are working on some practical wiring. We will also be measuring and calculating voltage, resistance, and current.

Grade 10

Bible 10 – Mr. de Visser: Students did a great job on the presentations of their Church History Project today! It's great to hear them articulate their understanding of the church's mission, how it has struggled to be faithful to it in the times before us, and what we must remember as we strive to be faithful going forward. Next week, we finish

looking at the intertestamental period and begin our study of the Gospels.

Canadian History since World War I – Miss Averink: Students have been busy presenting and working on their World War 2 presentations. We will continue these presentations next week taking a break on our double block to learn about the Holocaust.

Math 10D – Mr. Vander Deen: We are starting Chapter 4 which will take the next step in our understanding of quadratics. We will be learning about vertex form and how helpful this is in understanding quadratic relations. A retest for Ch. 3 will be on Tuesday.

Math 10P – Mrs. Barrett/Mrs. Tenhage: We will continue to solve unknown sides and angles for triangles, but most of our time next week will be spent on solving problems using trigonometry ratios. Unit 5 quiz Friday.

Science 10D – Ms. Xu: We are learning how to balance equations and classify types of chemical equations. A quiz will be given early this week. An investigation and the test is scheduled for next week. Please read and type out the procedure before conducting the investigation.

Grade 11 and 12

Accounting Essentials – Miss Averink: This week we have learned all about adjusting the books. Next week, we will continue this chapter and move on to our next Performance Task. Students are reminded to stay motivated with the content and to keep up with their homework!

Art IIM- Mrs. Bergsma: The students worked on their African coil pots this week, and finished building them on Thursday. They need a week to dry before we go on our fieldtrip next week to learn about the firing and glazing process. The artist statements are due next week Wednesday, Nov. 22nd.

Biology I I U – Miss Wattel: After completing our pig dissection our class is ready to start the next unit on genetics.

English IIC – Mrs. Pieterman: I've enjoyed hearing the students share stories as they write their memoir assignment. We'll work on peer editing and polishing memoirs, which are due next Tuesday, November 2. We'll also be delving into our next unit which will have the students considering the importance of words as they create poetry.

English I I U – Mrs. Vandermeyden: Students will create short instructional videos on an aspect of essay writing to share with the class. On Tuesday, we will be visiting Indwell during our double block. On Friday, we will debrief from our

trip and finish our study of *Cry the Beloved Country*. Students will prepare to write an in-class essay on a theme or character from the novel on Tuesday, November 28.

Entrepreneurship Venture Planning - Mr. Haklander:

This week students learned to identify resources that could be required to create a venture. Once they have identified these resources, they analyzed strategies to implement them into a venture plan.

Families in Canada 12U/C - Mrs. Barrett/Mrs.

Tenhage: Next week, we will finish unit 3; the test will be Tuesday November 28th. Next Tuesday is a double block day, so we have prepared to host a guest speaker panel on parenting (very exciting!). This is our entry event for unit 4, "Parent, Child & Family Relationships." Interview project: The students should contact (if they haven't already) a Christian couple to interview who has been married for at least I year and who is not their parents/sibling. Most students have questions prepared; they must have questions in the eight categories given on the assignment (see Teams for an additional copy, page 2). Students must take a picture of themselves with the couple they interview, and they will give an oral reflection via Teams screencast on how they can apply what they learned to present/future preparation for marriage. The interview reflection is due Friday December I, so they have two weekends to help with this assignment.

French IIU – Mrs. Bergsma: This week was full of formative literature circles on our novel. The students received teacher feedback and completed peer and self assessments to improve their next circles. On Thursday, they completed their final literature circle and read the rest of the book as a class. On Monday, Nov. 20th, they will write their test about the novel.

Functions IIU – Mr. Ellens: We continue to work through Trigonometric functions. We are looking at transformations of sinusoidal functions and graphing trig functions.

Math IIC – Ms. Xu: Students will hand in your project on Monday and be ready to present to the class your design of the dream house with details. We are going to cover chapter 4 Quadratic after presentations.

Philosophy IIM – Mr. Pennings: In the unit on metaphysics we have answered the question, "What is Man?" in light of God's revelation. The test for this unit was written on Wednesday. Students have a poster due today explaining how one of the major philosophers answered the big questions of life. Our next unit of study will be on the existence of God.

Philosophy 12U – Mr. de Visser: Students showed excellent engagement and critical thinking in their discussion of readings related to epistemology. Having written the unit test, we now turn to the next big question: in light of what the Bible says about our creation, about our purpose, and about truth, we must now consider, "how then shall we live?" Our worldview must have coherence and integrity. What kind of ethics flows from a Biblical worldview?

Recreation & Healthy Active Living Leadership 12M – Mr. Pennings: As a class we have been studying the three essential skills of a leader: communication, conflict resolution, and decision-making. There is a test on chapter 2 on Tuesday, Nov 21. The next topic of study will be on event planning. Students are starting to prepare for their event planning assignments which will be held on the next 5 Fridays, beginning on Nov 24.

Physics IIU – Ms. Xu: We will have the chapter II test next week. Make sure you finish daily assignments and ask questions whenever are needed.

Transportation Technology IIC – Mr. Haklander: Students have learned about steering systems and suspension geometry. This part of the chassis unit helped the students understand how the suspension, steering systems and tires affect the handling and ride of vehicles.

World History since the Fifteenth Century – Miss Averink: We have been learning about the Enlightenment and the American Revolution. Next week, we will learn about the French Revolution and prepare for our Unit 3 Test. Many students have started their Unit 3 Artifact Assignment. The final essays will be due on Friday with a peer review session on Thursday!
