Hospitality Trip to Harvest Hands

Just 40 km from the school, in the community of St Thomas, stands a large warehouse full of donated produce, dried goods, and other essential food items. Harvest Hands was founded in 2020 by Jim and Jacintha Collins with the goal of 'rescuing' and distributing food items to local and international communities. These communities include more than 140 food banks, missions, shelters, kitchens, seniors, and more.

This past Friday, our Hospitality and Tourism students had the opportunity to take a tour of this organization and learn about their mission to support and serve those living with food insecurity. The students worked for an hour bagging potatoes and carrots, packaging and labelling dried pasta, and cleaning warehouse floors. These were not meaningless jobs meant to keep the students busy; this was real work that benefits real people. Mrs. Bergsma and I were very impressed with the dedication and work ethic shown by our students. It was inspiring to see students climb the potato hopper to speed up the bagging process and to carefully sew and stack 10 lb bags of potatoes.

What does this have to do with hospitality? When we debriefed in class this week, we read a few quotes from Reverend Tony and Arley-Ann Zekveld's book, *Open Heart, Open Home: Reflections on Biblical Hospitality.* We learned that "the word 'hospitality' in the Bible (Romans 12:13; I Peter 4:9, I Timothy 3:2) comes from the Greek word *philoxenia*, which literally means "love or friendship to strangers." We likely won't meet the people who benefited from our work, but we were able to show love in our act of service.

Harvest Hands operates entirely through donations and volunteer help. Students in Ontario need to volunteer 40 hours before they graduate. This is an excellent way for our young people to bless others through selfless acts of service.

Spring Membership Meeting – Monday, April 22



Course Updates

Grade 9

Art 9 – Miss Averink: With our second unit complete, we start our third unit on the Principles of Design. We will start with printmaking next week and likely move to our Giant Playing Cards assignment.

English 9 – Miss Averink: Next week, our first full week in awhile, we have a busy schedule. Monday, we will start our third unit - a comparison novel study on John Steinbeck's *The Pearl* and William Golding's *Lord of the Flies*. Tuesday, April 16th will be our The Merchant of Venice test. There will also be regular reading homework throughout the week and comprehension quizzes to ensure students are keeping up.

English 9 – Mr. Vander Deen: We have had a good start into *The Pearl* and will be continuing our study this coming week. It is a short novella, and so we expect to finish by the end of the week, and then will start *The Lord of the Flies*. We will be doing a comparative analysis of the two novels.

Geography 9 – Mr. Pennings: The students have completed the Natural Resources presentations. We have been investigating the perspectives of various stakeholders during the Ring of Fire conference. The next lesson will focus on comparing the biblical and secular views of resource stewardship by analyzing a movie.

Math 9 – Ms. Xu: We will study the applications of linear relations on Monday and have a chapter test next Friday. Please bring pencil, ruler, calculator, and graph paper every day to the math class.

Grade 10

Career Studies 10 – Mrs. Barrett/Mrs. Tenhage: I'm thankful for the time I had with this grade 10 class; they are eager to learn! Any outstanding work should be submitted by Thursday night so it can be assessed for the report card. They did a lovely job on their Career Fair!

English 10D – Mrs. Vandermeyden: This week, we will write and revise our Julius Caesar essays. Make sure you have completed the pre-writing outline so that you can print it and take it to class for our in-class essay on Monday, April 15. We will work on revision and editing on Tuesday. On Wednesday, we will begin our study of *To Kill a Mockingbird* with a historical context research presentation.

English 10P – Mrs. Pieterman: As we begin our novel study of *To Kill a Mockingbird*, we discussed the setting of the story. A major theme of this book is racial prejudice, as it is set in the deep South in the 1930's, a time of much racial tension and civil rights movements. We'll unpack this theme as we work through the story.

French 10 – Mrs. Bergsma: The students have been working on some geography - specifically French names of countries, continents, etc., as well as the proper prepositions to use. They also worked on their menus which will be presented next week Wednesday. Their test for this unit will take place next week Friday.

Healthy Active Living – Mr. Pennings: The soccer unit is progressing smoothly. The soccer knowledge test will be on Thursday, April 18. The soccer skills testing will be on Friday, April 19. In health class the students should be working on their addictions poster.

Information Technology 10 – Mrs. Pieterman: We've completed our second unit, and students should now be much more familiar with the features of Microsoft Word. Our next unit has us exploring spreadsheet software in Microsoft Excel.

Grade 11 and 12

Advanced Functions – Mr. Ellens: We have finished up our test and will work a bit more on our chapter tasks. We have also started our next unit.

Bible 12 – Mr. de Visser: Students are reminded to complete their reading of chapters 3-9 of *Tactics* in preparation for our class discussion on Monday. Time has been given in class, but any that have not finished or missed a lesson must catch up. We're finishing our presuppositional part of our studies in apologetics. The test is scheduled for Thursday.

Biology I2U – Miss Wattel: We are beginning our weeklong experiment with CRSPR technology. Student will be completing an assignment and preparing for a debate on various biotechnology subjects.

Calculus & Vectors 12U – Mr. Ellens: We are well into our unit 3 on vectors. We are learning about vectors in two space and three space and how to visualize them, draw them, and find angles between them.

Chemistry IIU – Ms. Xu: We finished chapter 6, and the test is scheduled on April 17. We will start to learn stoichiometry on Monday. Don't miss the class for these two weeks. We will conduct an experiment on Tuesday and every student brings pre-lab report before the class starts.

Cooperative Education – Mr. Haklander: Students have been given their next assignment to be presented at their next in-class day May 3. For this assignment students are to create a power point and written research presentation that outlines their design for an ergonomic business relating to your placement and the possibility of entrepreneurial endeavours in the field. I would encourage the students to begin the project early to research ideas for this project.

English 12C – Mrs. Vandermeyden: This week, we will continue to use oral communication strategies as we listen and respond to the audio drama, Bonhoeffer: *The Cost of Freedom*. Our focus is on Bonhoeffer's faithful response to Christ in the midst of a nation that has turned its back on love, peace, and truth. We will have regular listening quizzes, and as a culminating assignment, students will have a choice of creative responses (short story, journal, newspaper article, illustrated book).

English 12U – Mr. Ellens: This week we plan on discussing the novel *Peace Shall Destroy Many* and the book *The Prodigal God*. We will be thinking about what legalism and antinomianism are and how they show up in Christianity and how to combat them. There will be readings, questions, and discussions.

Law IIM - Mrs. Bergsma: The students have been looking at how juries are selected for different types of cases. They also started tracking evidence discussed by the jury in Twelve Angry Men. On Thursday, they wrote a test about criminal law and criminal court cases. Next week, we will continue to build on our knowledge of criminal trial processes.

Hospitality & Tourism II – Mrs. Vandermeyden/Mrs. Bergsma: On Tuesday, the students discussed nutrition and reviewed Canada's Food Guide. They reflected on their own nutrition and worked on a nutrition advocacy assignment,

hoping to promote more healthy eating/living for PRC students. On Wednesday, they reviewed for their final test which they wrote on Thursday.

Math 12C – Mrs. Barrett/Mrs. Tenhage: Students realized how much work it is to do accurate primary research! I look forward to going through their results and graphs from their surveys. We have begun chapter 5; we hope to have a small test on chapter 5 content next Friday, April 19.

World History I I M – Mr. de Visser: Students have their Unit 3 Test on Greece and Rome on Tuesday. Any students who missed Thursday's class must catch up; the work is posted on Teams. Students are also working on gathering academic sources for their research essays. Their annotated bibliographies are due on Friday.

World Religions I IM – Mrs. Barrett/Mrs. Tenhage: Students have a trip overview and permission form for our final trip which is an all-day trip to Toronto on Friday, May 3 Ist. We look forward to connecting with Rev. Tony Zekveld (The Hope Centre) and Chris VanDyken (Hope Academy) while there. I also posted the form on Teams, as well as a copy of the FAQs (head coverings, food) students often and with a summary of Rev. Zekveld's answers (feel free to ask them to see that document). Next week, we start unit 3 on Eastern Religions, starting with Hinduism.
